Rector's Journal

St. John's Living Stones Campaign continues to progress and as we near autumn we thought now would be a good time for an update on what's happening. First, an update on the finances. As you may recall, we began with pre-campaign gifts of \$300,000, as well as a vestry-approved amount to be taken from St. John's Endowment of \$500,000, giving us a total of \$800,000 to begin with.



As of the publication of this newsletter, the good news is that pledges to the campaign that have been received since our June 22nd Commitment Sunday total just shy of \$170,000. This brings our overall total to \$970,000! This is a great start and many thanks to all who have made their pledge commitment. As I've said on numerous occasions, let me repeat: It is extremely important that every member of St. John's be part of this campaign. We have received pledges in the tens of thousands of dollars, and pledges of less than fifty dollars. NO pledge is too big! NO pledge is too small! Everyone can play a part! Also, please remember that pledges can be spread out over a three-year time frame, making it possible for people of every income range to make a commitment that works with their budget.

There is additional good news to report in that working with Bob Pike, of Conco Construction, our primary contractor, clarifying the scope of work with some of the subcontractors and making some minor changes to our original plans, yet keeping the overall designs intact, we have found cost savings that we estimate at around \$100,000, bringing our total funds very near the amount we now have on hand!

However, we have learned of a cost to the project that we had not initially planned for. The piping system from the boiler that heats the church sanctuary needs to be replaced. The cost for this work is \$127,000. Even so, as you can see, we are very close to achieving our goals.

Work Progress: Projects beginning in mid-August to September:

- Restrooms and Corridor of Education Building: paint, tile flooring, vinyl baseboards, and stair treads.
- Boiler piping repairs, insuring heat in the church in time for winter.

Please continue to pray for this project and let us be confident in God's provision!

Comments on Kenya

During the season of Lent, many of us followed the "Love Life" series of daily videos offered by email by

the brothers of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist. They continue to provide a "word" each day in seven languages. Last Sunday's emailed word was "need." "Need: The only way we can see Jesus in others, in the hunger and thirst and nakedness and estrangement and imprisonment of others, is to have known him ourselves and to have met him in those very places in our own lives."

With my fourth trip to Kenya, I was able to look more deeply at a range of basic needs that we share with our Kenyan brothers and sisters. In conditions of scarcity and widespread poverty it is easy to notice material and physical needs. We all need safe water, clean air, food, shelter, clothing, and security from

violence, universal access to basic education, health care and treatment when ill or injured. It is those needs that drive the decisions Kansas to Kenya makes when planning projects and programs for implementation in Kenya.

Some needs are obvious, but others are not so easily recognized. Even the most impoverished people have the need, the motivation and will to act with generosity by tending to the needs of their neighbors. Kenyans are responding not just to the physical needs for food, water and clothing but for the personal needs of acknowledgment and belonging. From the Christian communities that I have encountered, I have learned that Christ is easier to see in others when eyes are open to meeting him in everyday life. The body of Christ is alive while working and praying, walking and hauling, giving and in receiving. Any occasion is an opportunity to gather together and meet Christ.



Reflections on Kenya

Forgiveness. It is a concept that we talk about often in our Christian communities. It is an idea we draw comfort from when we think of God's forgiveness. It is a precept we tote as theologically significant. How often though, do we practice radical and unconditional forgiveness?

June 17th of this year I was in Mirangine, Kenya, a small rural community nearly 9,000 feet up a mountain. The Kansas to Kenya medical team traveled many kilometers on roads of decaying tarmac and mud trenches to reach this village. We passed farms that are green this year because the rains had come and young children were on the side of the roads tending the family flocks.

We were working in the local health clinic compound for Mirangine. The campus has several buildings and grassy spaces encompassed by a stone and concrete wall. Our team of doctors, dentists, nurses, pharmacists, and medical students had left for the clinic at 7 that morning, and as our watches passed 4pm we were beginning to see the light at the end of the tunnel in the shape of our beds at the bottom of the mountain.

With the medical team I served as a general organizer of people. The registration table and triage tent greeted our patients before they were ushered inside to see a doctor and I became the coordinator for those volunteering there. What the Kenyans saw as they reclined on the grass waiting for their turn in triage was a white girl sprinting about replenishing supplies, attempting to address questions being asked in a language she did not speak, and transferring patients from registration to triage to the medical professional they needed to see based upon complaint. They quickly determined that I was the person to talk to about getting all their distant relatives in to see a doctor. They also learned that I could slip them ahead of others who were waiting. Thus I became used to dark skinned hands of varying textures touching my arms and drawing my attention to deep brown eyes and coy smiles of people who knew they were trying to work the system. I would like to think that my expression was one of gentleness and compassion as I reminded them that they needed to wait their turn in the queue and that we were moving as quickly as we could.

As our day was winding down, I was getting a chance to move at a slower pace and causally check on the doctors to see how their dwindling patient loads were looking. Coming out of a consultation room I found myself face to face with a young woman who was waiting for me. Her expression immediately caught my attention. Rather than the usual wanting look, I was met with a simple, direct, and honest gaze. Without any words exchanged she pulled back her jacket to reveal her forearm. As I took in the scene before me all I remember thinking was, "Your skin is the same color as mine. It is not supposed to look like that."

As I called for our triage paramedic to get his gear back out and found her a seat, I was trying to understand the clear fluid dripping from her forearm and her smooth white skin that transferred seamlessly to black. A burn perhaps, but I had never seen a burn such as this before. Then again, I was not sure I had ever seen someone who was not white badly burned. This realization surprised me given that I have spent 4 years working in a hospital, 1 of which was in the ER.



With the paramedic and translator, I recorded her medical history and present condition. Her story began to unfold.

What we were looking at was indeed a burn. Second degree bordering on third. Her neighbor, and best friend, had been breaking into her house the past few days. When this woman went to confront her, her friend flew into a rage and grabbed a pot of boiling water and threw it on her. We were a bit stunned, angry on her behalf and thankful that only her arm had been caught by the liquid. As we consulted with

doctors and dressed her wounds, we talked with her about the importance of keeping the wound clean and dry to prevent infection, as well as the role rest played in the healing process.

These basic medical practices seem incongruous out there in Mirangine. This woman was going home to a crowded shack with a dirt floor, meals to prepare, and water to haul. She had multiple children to care for, the oldest of which was 8 and would be able to help with only some of her duties. Keep the wound clean, dry, and rest the arm. We might as well as have told her to fly to the moon.

The hubbub died down and while we were waiting for a script from our pharmacy to come through for her she continued to talk with the translator. Later the translator shared with me the woman's response to the suggestion of pursuing legal action against her neighbor. She said she felt like she needed to go home and forgive her friend, forgive her neighbor. Her mind was less on how she was going to make dinner to feed her children, or how she was going to keep her arm from becoming infected, or even how to deal with her neighbor so that she would no longer break in. Her thoughts were on how to seek justice through restored community and reconciliation with the one who had wronged her rather than by means of law enforcement, how to see healing come, not through time and a controlled sterile environment, but through the freedom and grace found in forgiveness.

My prayer is that we might all be able to see our relationships in this light. That we might put forgiveness, freedom, grace, and hope above all that wounds, binds, and controls. May we be a people who live deeply in restoration of lives and communities as we are a people who come to know more and more about forgiveness as seen from Christ's vantage point on the cross. Amen.



Bishop Dean E. Wolfe today announced that the Reverend Meghan F. Froehlich, the diocese's Canon Interim, has concluded her time of service with the diocese. Meghan will be tending to family matters of immediate concern in Ohio and Virginia as she discerns her future ministry.

The bishop said, "Canon Froehlich showed immediate competence in one of the most complex jobs in The Episcopal Church. She fulfilled our regular Canon to the Ordinary duties, along with key additional ones. We put her many gifts to their fullest use."

Froehlich said of her time in the diocese, "I will take the love and inspiring examples of the people of Kansas into my future ministry. I am a better priest for having served here and will always treasure and be grateful for our time together."

The bishop and Dave Seifert, Missioner for Transitions, will continue to work closely with parishes conducting clergy searches. Bishop Wolfe has established an advisory committee, led by Council of Trustees President Bob Skaggs, to assist him in the selection of a new Canon to the Ordinary.

Sunday, August 17 at 12:30 p.m.





Our Back Seats in Church [Page Sixty-five]


Isn't it strange that so many people love the back seats in the church? Some of the young people like them because they can "cut-up" there occasionally. But, fortunately, most of them are very reverent.
