First, we had our **Commitment Sunday for the Living Stones**

Campaign on June 22. I want to thank the many parishioners who turned in pledge cards on that day, or who have subsequently turned in pledge cards and/or checks. Second, I am pleased to report that the **vestry unanimously voted in June to offer a position to Father Ted Blakley to be our full-time curate from August 1, 2014 through December 31, 2015.** Father Ted was ordained a priest on June 7, 2014 at Grace Cathedral, and his work with us on a fulltime basis will provide us with a valuable resource and an opportunity to expand our ministries. Father Ted's academic background has been and will continue to be a helpful asset as we plan educational programs for the next year. During the season of Lent, many of us followed the <u>"Love Life"</u> series of daily videos offered by email by the brothers of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist. The brothers continue to provide by email a "word" each day in seven languages. Last Sunday's word was the following:

"**Need:** The only way we can see Jesus in others, in the hunger and thirst and nakedness and estrangement and imprisonment of others, is to have known him ourselves and to have met him in those very places in our own lives."

With my fourth trip to Kenya, I was able to look more deeply at a range of basic needs that we share with our Kenyan brothers and sisters. In conditions of scarcity and widespread poverty, it

is easy to notice material and physical needs. It is those needs that drive the decisions Kansas to Kenya makes when planning projects and programs for implementation in Kenya. We all need safe water, clean air, food, shelter, clothing, and security from violence, access to education, health care and treatment when ill or injured.

What is not so easily recognized is that even the most impoverished people have the need, the motivation and will to act with generosity by tending to the needs of their neighbors. Kenyans are

responding not just to the physical needs for food, water and clothing but for the personal needs of acknowledgment and belonging.

From the Christian communities that I have encountered, I have learned that Christ is easier to see in others when eyes are open to meeting him in everyday life. The body of Christ is alive while working and praying, walking and hauling, giving and in receiving. Any occasion is an opportunity to gather together and meet Christ.

What we are able to do in Kenya is share from our more abundant resources, not with a "hand-out" but with a hand up. We are able to see from year to year that improvements are being made and programs built on the foundations that we have started laying down. I thank the vestry and congregation for supporting me to make the trip again this year. I will be sharing stories and information in the months to come and would be glad to see others have an opportunity to experience what Cora Olson and I experienced this year.

Meet St. John's New Music Staff

Ken Breeden, choir director, grew up near Great Bend, KS. He attended Wichita State on a music scholarship, receiving a BME in 1971. Ken taught for 5 years at Bishop Carroll, and at Clearwater for a year before finishing his MME in 1977. He spent the rest of his professional career teaching middle and high school vocal music at Bluestem High School in Leon, KS, where he was named Teacher of the Year for USD 205 in 2002. He has served as choir director &/or organist for several area churches, including St. Stephen's Episcopal Church. Ken and his wife Tammy have been married for 43 years. Their son Josh, his wife Monica and their children, Rhys and Kai, live in California.

Dr. David Childs, organist, grew up in Baptist parsonages in upstate New York, enjoying hymns and gospel music. He

studied piano as a boy, sang solos, and enjoyed playing his own compositions. At Houghton College, David studied church music where his organ teacher, Dr. Finney, related his experiences as organist at St. John's Episcopal Church in Wichita, KS. David received MA and PhD degrees in music and a degree in divinity at Peabody College (part of Vanderbilt) in Nashville, TN. He moved to Wichita to teach at WSU, also preaching in Presbyterian churches for a time until 1967, when he came to St. John's as organist and choir director. Fifteen years later he was confirmed in the Episcopal church. In 1988, he left WSU to chair the music department at Concordia in Moorhead, MN. Upon retirement, David and his wife Jeanette returned to Wichita, where he has continued to play.

Priority Registration Deadline for MissionPalooza is July 7!

Register now for MissionPalooza, an urban mission trip close to home. It trains teens to put their faith into action. For five days youth come together with youth from the Episcopal Diocese of West Missouri in community, mission, fellowship, and worship. Students spend four days in the urban mission field heeding Christ's call to feed the hungry, visit the sick, and comfort those in need. Youth get to select where they would like to serve from a list of options like Habitat for Humanity, Wayside Waifs, Operation Breakthrough, Kansas City Community Kitchen, and Bishop Spencer Place (which can all be used for required school volunteer hours!). In the evenings we gather for a yummy dinner, prepared by volunteer churches in the Kansas City area, then fun activities like arts & crafts, games, movie night, a trip to the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, a cook-out and swimming night and worship. St. John's History ... by Parish Historian, Katie Pott



115 years ago

Wichita Daily Beacon, July 1, 1899: St. John's Episcopal church is undergoing great improvements. An elegant new carpet of a rich, ruby red and black color covers the entire floor and chancel. The church walls have been elegantly frescoed. The costly and beautifully carved pews are now being placed in the auditorium of the building. The church will be entirely finished by Thursday of next week.

Wichita Daily Eagle, July 20, 1899: At the meeting of the vestry last night, held to investigate charges preferred against Rev. J. F. von Herrlich, of the Episcopal church by Mrs. S.N. Fuller, the following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, That we the vestry of St. John's church, have carefully

investigated the charges made by Mrs. S.N. Fuller against the Rev. J.F. von Herrlich, and we find them entirely unfounded, and we exonerate him therefrom." July 23, 1899: CHURCHES St. John's — Morning subject: "Made Perfect Through Suffering."

The Kansas Churchman, July-August, 1899: The fortieth annual Convention of the diocese of Kansas will be held in St. John's Church, Wichita, on Wednesday and Thursday, the 27th and 28th of September, 1899. [. . .] The opening services of the Convention will be held on Tuesday evening, the 26th, when will occur the consecration to Almighty God of St. John's Church, Wichita, by the Bishop of the diocese. All the clergy are expected to be in the chancel at this service.

65 years ago

Vestry Minutes, July 5, 1949: The first matter of business was the matter of purchasing the organ pipes offered by the First Methodist Church for \$350. The rector explained why they were suitable for the organ we plan to build. [...] After much discussion the vote was cast and the motion carried unanimously.

60 years ago

Vestry Minutes, July 7, 1954, 12:15 p.m., Lassen Hotel: The matter of the Sunday service had on July 4, 1954, was brought up by the Rector [The Rev. R. L. Whitehouse] and by the Vestry for discussion. Messrs. [...] all stated that they had received numerous complaints by telephone and otherwise from members of the parish concerning the services of Sunday, July 4, 1954, all protesting the type of service had; many stating that they would not support an Anglo-Catholic type of service and if that was to be the practice in the future they would withdraw from St. John's. Messrs. [...] spoke in favor of the type of service rendered. [One] stated that he had received several telephone calls protesting the service, while [one] stated that he had received only one. \sim The Treasurer further stated that he had received communications from 25 different persons, all contributors to St. John's, who were either cancelling or reducing their pledges, which reduced our potential income for the remainder of the year in the approximate sum of \$2000. \sim The majority of the Vestry stated that for the sake of the church, they preferred not to have any further Anglo-Catholic type of services and asked the Rector what his intentions were in this regard. \sim The Rector in reply, frankly stated that he would continue the use of Sanctus bells and all other practices available to the church — this contrary to the wishes of a majority of the Vestry. The Rector further stated that during the penitential season the services would be low church.

55 years ago

The Rev. Frederic J. Raasch's Parish Visitor, July 15, 1959: How much do you appreciate the three art glass or stained windows above the Altar in St. John's Church? This past week a representative from a large church window firm called on us. As we slowly walked through our church to examine each window, the representative paused a long time to

behold the beauty of the three stained glass windows. So we casually asked him how much it would cost to replace one of the windows in case of damage. His considered judgment was that it would cost no less than \$3,000 per window. While your Rector has no opportunity to gaze upon these beautiful windows while conducting the services in the church, he often enters the church during the week for meditation and inspiration. He finds that everything in St. John's Church testifies to the fact that this is verily a beautiful House of Worship. Small wonder that so many people are willing to drive so many miles in order to offer their worship to God in beautiful and churchly St. John's! After all, in these days of modern transportation distance is measured more in terms of minutes than in miles.



50 years ago

Parish Visitor, July 8, 1964: Chapel Veils Especially during the summer the women and girls may leave their homes and go to church without their hats and bonnets. Then, when they arrive at church they remember that they forgot. But don't let this excite you, ladies, because we have a supply of chapel veils for just such instances. These neat, lacy veils were made by the girls of the Sixth Grade in our Church School. Just ask the ushers for a veil. You may even have a choice of colors!



Thank You to Our Recent Sandwich Saturday Volunteers!

St. John's parish hosted Sandwich Saturday on June 28, providing a nourishing lunch for our neighbors. This caring ministry takes place every Saturday under the portico on the east side of St. John's, and is hosted on a rotating basis by a partnership of local churches.
