Rector's Journal: WHY RED??

According to a post in the Archive of The Episcopal Church, to the question, "Why is the church door red?" one finds the following:

"The red door tradition goes back to the beginnings of cathedral architecture in the Middle Ages. The color red, signifying the Blood of Christ, was painted on the north, south and east doors of a church. Such symbolism represented making the sign of the cross -- Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Thus the edifice was marked as a sanctuary, identified as a refuge and safety zone from physical or spiritual dangers. The red doors shut out evil. Supposedly an enemy could not pursue his victim across the sacred threshold."

And so, with the forward movement of the St. John's Living Stones Campaign, we have finally made real something we've talked about doing for quite some time. The doors are painted red, and in your rector's humble opinion it couldn't come at a better time. Consider the symbolic significance as described above and what it means for us today just as surely as it did for our faith ancestors of medieval times.



Red... Signifying the Blood of Christ it gives to us the assurance of Christ's blood

shed for humanity's redemption and given to us each time we enter through these doors – "The blood of Christ the cup of salvation."

Red... Signifying sanctuary, a refuge from the powers and dangers of this world, the evil and violence that oppress and destroy the creatures of God, beyond the red doors there is holy ground where the Peace of the Lord provides comfort and grace.

Therefore let these doors stand as a symbol to all who would enter that they are welcomed in the name of Him who gave himself for us. They will find within these doors a place of sanctuary where the One who ate with outcasts and sinners invites all to dine at the Feast of the Kingdom. Let the red doors open wide so that all may find their way in, and all may find the way out into the world, going in Peace, to love and serve the Lord. Amen.

The Bishop's Visit



LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER ...

Many of us are deeply troubled by the tragic cycle of continuing violence around the world. We each struggle in our own way to deal with the complex maze of inner feelings about the many international crises. It is a comfort to know that we are not alone in our struggles or in our hopes for people in distant and unfamiliar places. Even as tragedy and suffering are occurring to so many people now and throughout history, there are also passionate and faithful voices calling for peace and healing, praying for an end to oppression, retaliation and hatred.

Our Presiding Bishop, Katharine Jefferts Schori, has called for our prayers for many instances of violence and human misery. Her most recent call to prayer is in response to violence in Iraq that has included the slaying of Christians, Yazidis, and other Iraqi religious minorities living in fear of their lives, livelihoods, and ways of living and believing. We are asked to pray for an end to the destruction and looting of churches, homes, and places of business; and the displacement of thousands under the threat of death. "Pray that all God's children might live in hope of the world of peace for which we were created," she said.

In another location, Episcopal Relief & Development continues to provide support for the 80-bed Al-Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza, an institution of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, as it responds to critical humanitarian needs during the current conflict.

We are called to prayer for the humanitarian tragedy continuing with tribal and ethnic violence in the Central African Republic. Hospitals have been looted and staff have fled, leaving an already vulnerable population with no access to medical care. With the drug supply system disrupted and food insecurity exacerbated by a poor harvest, malaria is on the rise and there are fears of increased malnutrition. Rape and sexual violence are common methods of warfare. Human trafficking and administrative corruption are wide-spread. Children are being recruited and deployed in the armed forces of several African and Middle Eastern countries. Humanitarian workers and peacekeepers as well as vulnerable populations are in need of protection, food and water, shelter, sanitation and medical care.

Even in our own country, ecumenical efforts of churches, faith communities, interfaith partners, civic and social organizations are calling for our prayers for calm, for peaceful protest, and for open and honest dialogue on racism and issues of class.

Each week, the World Council of Churches (WCC) takes us on a journey in prayer through every region of the world. In our Prayers of the People we affirm our solidarity with Christians all over the world, brothers and sisters living in diverse situations, with diverse problems and diverse gifts. 





A Look Back at St. John's History by Parish Historian, Katie Pott

120 years ago . .

Wichita Eagle, September 1, 1894: St. John's church was crowded to its utmost capacity by a fashionable audience last evening at the concert given by the graduating pupils of the Mozart school of music. ~ The affair was quite a social event. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers and palms, and the young ladies graduating were gowned in white, carrying flowers. Four young girls in white acted as ushers.

September 26: Last night a chorus of forty voices met at the Episcopal church. They took up some of the choruses of the catchy piece "The Merry Milkmaids," which is to be put on here in a few weeks by that church. It was given in Wellington and the EAGLE force were serenaded by telephone. It is bright and beautiful and will have the

assistance of some of Wichita's best talent. September 30: One week's work of rehearsal shows the opera of the "Merry Milkmaids" to be well on the way to production. The chorus has met afternoon and evening each day in the basement of the Episcopal church for whom it is to be given. The ensemble members are very pretty and approaching climaxes in a very musical way. 115 years ago . .

Wichita Beacon, September 7, 1899: In the presence of a church full of friends of the bride and groom, Miss Elizabeth Maude McCoy and Mr. Joseph Lawrence Newman were married at 10 o'clock yesterday morning at St. John's Episcopal church. Archdeacon Watkins of Salina was the officiating clergyman. The ceremony used was the beautiful ring service of the Episcopal church. ~ At 10 o'clock the bride's party appeared at the entrance to the church and proceeded up the aisle with the ushers. Following them came the bridesmaid and then the bride on the arm of her father. From a vestry room the groom and his best man came at the same moment meeting the remainder of the bridal party at the altar before which Archdeacon Watkins was standing. Then ensued the short, but impressive service of the church. ~ Throughout the ceremony a chorus of thirty-five voices from the Wichita Musical club sang appropriate selections from Lohengrin, greeting the bridal couple as they made their appearance with the beautiful strains of the immortal chorus, "Bring Forth the Bride," and humming the succeeding choruses as the ceremony proceeded. ~ The church was elaborately decorated for the occasion, palms and potted plants almost hiding the altar from view. . .

September 23: All persons who have promised to sing at St. John's church next Wednesday morning, also the Vested Choir, will meet at the church tonight for rehearsal. Come early. September 27: The fortieth annual convention of the Kansas diocese of the Episcopal church is in session today. Last night there was an informal reception at St. John's church for the visitors and this morning the Rt. Rev. Gilbert, bishop of Minnesota, preached a sermon to a large audience at the church. A hundred lay and ministerial delegates are present at this afternoon's convention. By tomorrow morning fifty more are expected.

September 29: At a meeting of the young ladies of St. John's Episcopal church yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Dodge of Abilene, president of the order for the Diocese of Kansas, organized a chapter of the Daughters of the King.

95 years ago...

Vestry Minutes, September 16, 1919: The Parish House committee reported the purchase of 100 feet of frontage on Topeka Ave. between 3rd and Central. . . Report of Inspector Webb regarding the boiler was read. The committee agreed to see that the work was attended to.

75 years ago...

Vestry minutes, September 6, 1939: . . a vote of thanks was tendered the young people for their work in redecorating the undercroft.

50 years ago...

Parish Visitor, September 13, 1964: How many of our people have noticed that the house at 419 N. Emporia has been torn down? What now? After allowing the fill to settle for a few months, the Vestry will have this vacant lot converted into additional parking for our people. Thus it is that historic St. John's which in a few years from now will observe its Centennial Anniversary, is still planning and preparing for the future! Why not? . . Speaking about planning for St. John's future, one of the top priorities on the Vestry's agenda is the prospect of installing an elevator in the church. The Vestry and Rector feel that special consideration is due those of our loyal and faithful members who find it increasingly difficult to climb the many steps. Thus we conclude that an elevator is far more a necessity than a luxury item. . . two problems: 1. where to install it; 2. the cost of installation. Perhaps there may be some people in our parish who would be willing to underwrite the cost of an elevator either as a fitting memorial or as a special thank offering. Now that we have brought this matter to the attention of our people, we would like to have you tell us what you think of the idea. September 27: Thus far we have had no volunteers to pay for the installation of an elevator in our church. However, we are very patient! [14 years later it was installed]


Rounding Up Church Keys
