RECTOR'S JOURNAL

"Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."

– Galatians 6:2

Most of us know what it is like to give and receive support during times of trial, when burdens that seem more than we can carry alone threaten to overwhelm us. Stepping forward to lend someone a hand, preparing a meal for a grieving family, a card or letter to reassure the despondent that they are not forgotten and that they are held in the deepest of prayer – all of these, ways large and small, are the ways we, as a Christian community, bear one another's burdens.

That we do such things would for some be enough, but for St. Paul the issue went deeper than simply doing good deeds out of kindness' sake. For Paul, the act of burden bearing on behalf of another was to demonstrate the spiritual reality underlying the behavior. It pointed to the source. It fulfilled Christ's law.

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." – John 15:12-13

As Christians, loving deeds of sacrifice on behalf of another are not, in and of themselves, good. My bearing your burden, or your bearing mine, does not automatically "fulfill the law of Christ." Human beings can be motivated to help another person, as we all know too well, for less than Godly reasons.

Reading on, we see that Paul gives a last bit of advice on the topic when he writes:

"Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit." – Galatians 6:7-8

Questions for a Holy Lent:

What is your life sowing? What is your life reaping?

Do you try to fit Christ into your life, or your life into Christ?

In Their Shoes



They were ordinary men. They were not scholars or priests. They chose to leave their jobs, leave their families, to follow this man called Jesus. Maybe it was the way He spoke, the things He said. Maybe it was His charisma. Maybe it was the miracles they witnessed along the way, the excitement they felt. Maybe it was the hope He gave people everywhere they went. These ordinary men became His band of followers. Over and over they heard the stories. Town to town they travelled; day to day they counseled with Him. They saw that nothing was impossible with Jesus.

What a thrill it must have been to follow Him on His triumphant ride into Jerusalem!

Though Jesus had tried to prepare them, these men could not begin to comprehend that which was to come. He had given them The Word they would need to carry on His work, but they did not know they would have to do it without Him. It happened so quickly. One Last Supper, a night in the Garden; then daybreak brought the sound of a cock. Events unfolded in unimaginable ways. How frightened and frantic they must have felt. After He had saved others, why didn't He save Himself? They had followed Him; they had risked everything for Him.

Then He was gone.

Fear, confusion, anger, dismay? What must they have felt in those first hours, in those next two days before His Resurrection? They who were closest, they who had shared so much time with Him were bereft. What did their faith look like during those long hours? Why had He left them? What was left for them to believe? Inconsolable they sat. Then came the words "He is Risen!"

Joy, confusion, doubt, disbelief. In the glory of a sunrise, the world changed. Ever-lasting Hope was born. His words – those words He spoke so many times – became clear to these followers. They would tell His Story – over, and over and over again. His Story would be heard around the world – He, the Son of God, born not to rule in this world but in the next, came to save us! More than 2,000 years later we continue to hear His Word. Hallelujah!

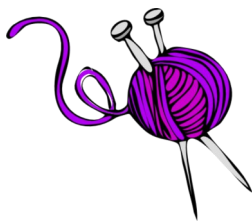

Beginning Tuesday, March 29, there will be a new ministry at St. John's with which you can be involved. There is a need for warm scarves and hats during the winter for our friends who come to Sandwich Saturday and for others who may have a need but can't afford them. We hope that Knit with Knowledge will be able to fill that need. Knit with Knowledge is a ministry where we'll gather to knit/crochet scarves and hats and maybe learn something at the same time. St. John's Holy Week and Easter

Palm Sunday, March 20—Easter Day, March 27, 2016

<p>March 20: Palm Sunday The Liturgy of the Palms Rite I 8:00 a.m. Rite II 10:30 a.m. Spanish-language 1:00 p.m.</p>	<p>The traditional blessing of the palms begins each service on this day. The Liturgy of the Palms recounts the events of all of Holy Week, from Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, where "they paved his way with palm branches" through his crucifixion at Calvary. The tone of the service this day gradually moves from its beginning of great celebration to its ending of somber contemplation.</p>
<p>March 21-23: Holy Week Wednesday 5:30 p.m.</p>	<p>A Service of Evening Prayer is conducted in the Chancel.</p>
<p>March 24: Maundy Thursday Holy Eucharist 6:00 p.m. Jueves Santos 8:00 p.m.</p>	<p>This day is the beginning of what the church calls the Triduum Sacrum (the sacred three days of Holy Week: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday). The Maundy Thursday Service includes a ritual of foot-washing, the dramatic stripping of the altar with growing darkness, and the Holy Eucharist with consecration of sufficient Sacrament to reserve for Good Friday.</p>
<p>March 25: Good Friday Stations of the Cross Noon Proper Liturgy for Good Friday 6:00 p.m. Viernes Santo 8:00 p.m.</p>	<p>At noon, we will move through the Stations of the Cross. This devotional practice is based on the time Jesus carried the cross through the streets of Jerusalem to the place of crucifixion.</p> <p>The Proper Liturgy for Good Friday is celebrated at 6:00 p.m. Holy Communion is offered from Reserved Sacrament.</p> <p>Spanish-language service.</p>
<p>March 26: Holy Saturday The Great Vigil and First Eucharist of Easter 8:00 p.m.</p>	<p>The Great Vigil of Easter is one of the Church's most ancient liturgies. We begin in the dark, as Christ is still in the grave, and as we wait for Christ's rising, we hear lessons and sing hymns recalling God's saving deeds in history. The Service of Light begins with the kindling of fire, the lighting of candles and the procession of the Pascal Candle to its stand. With the church restored to full light, we proclaim the Easter acclamation, "Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed!" The Vigil then transitions to the First Easter Eucharist.</p>
<p>March 27: Easter Sunday Rite I Holy Eucharist 8:00 a.m. Rite II Holy Eucharist 10:30 a.m. Spanish-language 1:00 p.m.</p>	<p>The 8:00 a.m. Easter Sunday Rite I Holy Eucharist is a spoken service in traditional language.</p> <p>Easter Potluck Brunch in the Undercroft from 9:15 a.m. until 10:30 a.m.</p> <p>The 10:30 a.m. Easter Sunday Festive Rite II Holy Eucharist includes music, with choir and organ.</p> <p>An Easter egg hunt will follow the Spanish language service. All are welcome!</p>

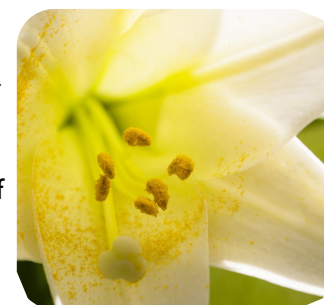

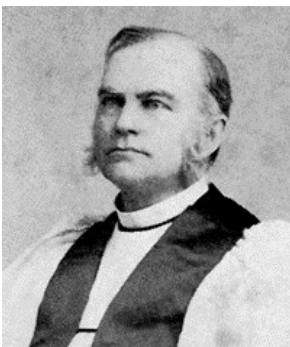
St. John's History

120 years ago

Easter Souvenir Mirror.

The Mirror, Easter, 1896: When the idea of the ladies of St. John's Episcopal church publishing an Easter Souvenir MIRROR was first proposed, the ladies, always ready to work for the interest of the church, took hold of the matter with energy, although they were fully persuaded that the task was no slight one. ~ A meeting was called by the rector, Rev. von Herrlich, and the matter was canvassed most thoroughly in all of its bearings. The expense was carefully estimated, and when it was shown that by hard, earnest effort a neat sum could be realized for the church, the ladies enthusiastically voted to take up the work. At this first meeting an executive committee was appointed, upon whom would rest the responsibility of the undertaking. . . . The committee was to co-operate with Mr. John Carter, publisher of THE MIRROR, in publishing this Easter Souvenir—to solicit advertising, invite contributions and otherwise plan to make this edition a credit to St. John's church and Wichita. How well they have succeeded is for the reader to judge. The ladies hope their efforts will be appreciated, for the accomplishment of their purpose was at the expense of much personal comfort, and was for the benefit of a cause in which every true citizen has an interest. ~ The ladies are grateful for the generous encouragement they received from the merchants, also for the assistance rendered by those who have so kindly contributed articles and poems to the paper. They especially desire to thank Mr. E. E. Bleckley of the Missouri Pacific, for the large advertisement secured from his road, the Royal Baking Powder Co. for the large lithographed advertisement on cover, Mr. Robert Marquis for his generosity in supplying the page of Easter music, and the "Living Church" for the loan of the cuts of Bishops Vail and Millspaugh. ~ The ladies have worked hard, but as their labors have been crowned with success, and they will be enabled to turn into the treasury a snug sum realized from the enterprise, they turn to the holy joy of the Easter festival with the consciousness of a duty faithfully performed. ~ We heartily desire to thank Mr. John Carter, publisher of THE MIRROR, for the valuable assistance he has rendered in the publishing of this Souvenir. He kindly took all the details of the work upon his own shoulders, and relieved the committee of the task of editing the paper, proof-reading, etc. He has proven himself willing and ready to lend assistance and give advice on all occasions, and thereby has relieved the committee of much anxiety.



The Rt. Rev. Elisha Thomas, 2nd Bishop of the Diocese of Kansas

Bishop Thomas. The accompanying cut is a portrait of our late, much-loved Bishop Thomas. His death is a loss which we realize even more now than when we first knew that he had left us. He will ever be particularly associated in this parish with the stone church, for when our rector started east to raise funds, Bishop Thomas, while weighed down with the load of indebtedness in other parts of the state, most generously gave him letters of introduction to his own wealthy eastern friends, from whom he hoped to obtain some financial aid for this diocese. ~ Who can ever forget Bishop Thomas' face, or the noble words he uttered the last time he ever stood in our chancel and told us of the missions, and said, "How many of you have prayed for the success of your own rector as he goes from person to person working for you?" Strength and nobility of character and a fine intellect was the birthright of Bishop Thomas from a long line of New England ancestry. He was cousin to one of the most famous physicians that America has every produced, T. Galliard Thomas of New York City. He brought all the inherited and acquired power of his mind, and spent his strength and life in the Kansas work. In his devotion to duty he took a long eighteen mile ride over the desolate plains of western Kansas in the bleak wind, in order to place his hand upon the head of one about to pass to the great unknown. The cold which he took that day, he never recovered from, and in a few short weeks his body was laid to rest in the quiet graveyard in Rhode Island. But his life and example remain, stimulating us to finish the work in which he was so much interested.
